PARISH NOTES

THIS WEEKEND we celebrate the fifth Sunday of Lent, the start of the inner season of Passiontide. "Celebrate" has a different ring these days, when little celebration is evident. We are part of seemingly a universal lock-down. Sister Ethel in rural and remote Zambia tells of her school's closure and self-isolation everywhere. But with Martha & Mary we will rejoice that Jesus is the conqueror even over death as he raises Lazarus from the dead.

CLOCKS FORWARD Even time has taken on a new dimension; our ordinary timetable—governed by work, duty & ritual—is on hold. The rhythm of daily rituals and duties and journeys and chores are suspended, as seemingly is time. I rarely look at my watch! A strange feeling of the springtime enlightening now being our clock and even calendar.

PURPLING The mystic ritual of covering all our images this weekend is much-reduced. I hope that our external images, statues and crucifixes, might be covered as a sign even of the times. Our purpling coincides with our journeying with Jesus to his suffering and death. With so many in our world shouldering that cross these days, there is a fitting empathy, and encouragement to prayer.

LOCKED CHURCHES Earlier this week we had to lock our churches. Thanks to those who maintained a "holy (open) hour" up till then. Respecting the sudden closure of Confessionals and constraints on priestly ministry to the sick, The Vatican has issued extraordinary directives on Plenary Indulgences and absolution. Last Sunday we were allowed to open the churches at usual worship-time. Not so this weekend.

REDEDICATION OF ENGLAND AS MARY'S DOWRY In 1381 King Richard II dedicated England to Mary as her Dowry. The Bishops of England have been preparing for the Rededication of England to Mary for some time. It will take place at the National Catholic Shrine, the Basilica of Our Lady in Walsingham at 12 noon on Sunday 29th March (though this will now be done behind closed doors because of coronavirus restrictions). At this worrying time in our history as a nation, under the threat of this pandemic and deprived of the ability to attend Holy Mass because of the health risks, Catholics throughout England are invited to join the Act of Rededication of this country to Mary as her Dowry. RESPONDING TO PASTORAL EMERGENCIES

Bishop Patrick has asked those priests who are deemed to be "at risk" temporarily to stand down from external pastoral ministry

These priests may neither leave, nor welcome folk into their presbytery for pastoral ministry. They remain available for "ordinary" (whatever that can mean in these

extraordinary times) ministry.

The remaining priests in each deanery are now taking on emergency pastoral duties. Locally, that means on this eastern side of the Peak, Fr Martin and Fr Daniel are taking turns at being the priest on call for 24 hours at a time. HOLY WEEK AHEAD Directives have been issued from Rome this week about the celebration of Palm Sunday and Holy Week. Grim reading! The celebrations are to be offered by clergy everywhere in locked and empty churches. Happily however, our Bishop hopes to stream all Masses & liturgies from the (empty) Cathedral.

UNEXPECTED DELIGHTS

- This week has been oddly a time also to give God thanks for unsought blessings: Standing under a pink-blossomed cherry tree and be delighted in the buzzing-umbrella of bees rejoicing with eager joy at the new-nectar prospect;
- The resurgence of God's Noah-covenant sign. After the Flood, God showed a rainbow to signify his newly-established covenant of love for his people. In this week of springtime weather after the floods and storms of recent times the rainbow was resurgent in our land in window and pathway:
- Receiving countless messages asking after the clergy's health, and promising support
 and prayer. Even more messages offering that support to folk who are deemed to be in
 need;
- The blizzard of e-messages telling of Mass-streaming, prayer-resources, and all manner of consolation for the afflicted;
- The discovery of Whatsapp and its curious delights (not least that Fr Daren is streaming Mass . . .)
- Meeting devout folk outside the church—just sitting for an hour (thank God for the earlier warmth) to "be close to the Lord". Then reflecting on the word "sanctuary", etymologically rooted in Holiness, and how many folk must be seeking sanctuary from present circumstance. And our holy places are locked . . .
- But not to nesting birds! Both at Immaculate Conception (tree-creepers, nuthatches and even jays), and St Charles (blue & great tits and bullfinches) seeking nesting-sites;
- And the silence of the skies, with the usual cavalcade of overhead aircraft now grounded—but allowing the delight of springtime bird-song;
- And reading the story of the Plague at near-by Eyam 1665-6, and the valiance of the rector Mompesson and erstwhile rector Stanley. Not so much self-isolation as village isolation.
- The discovery of 'Magnificat's excellent liturgy sheet for home-use this weekend. Please download it and use it.
