PARISH NOTES

THIS WEEKEND we journey (damply and coolly) into July, and the fourteenth ordinary Sunday. These days of unlocking and loosening of constraints will have found all of us thronging the pubs yestereve; seeking out our favourite eateries, and getting closer to each other. And besieging the barber shops or better . . .

Except in church.

Many folk are streaming to Mass in nearby and faraway places, and message me to tell of Mass being publicly celebrated, hymns sung and groups of parishioners in attendance. And of course they ask "When for us"? A few pointers:

In Bishop's messages of recent days we are reminded that the Obligation to go to Mass on Sunday is suspended, and will continue to be suspended for the foreseeable future;

We have received 28 dense pages of advice and direction towards opening for private devotional visits, as a necessary prelude to Sunday worship.

Eager and generous-hearted parishioners have made impressive inroads into the church-preparing, steward-seeking, form-filling, risk-assessing, labelling, signing and taping necessities. In the next few days we will be able to send our portfolios of documentation to the Bishop for him to say yeah or nay to our request to open up. (Incidentally, our diocese continues to mandate the 2-metre distancing in churches - which seriously reduces our eligible number of worshippers at any one time).

Once approval is given we must decide what we open up for.

And that's where you and I pause for thought. If our churches were authorised for all-comers, in whatever number, we'd be in the fast lane. If we could sing hymns we'd be thrilled; if we didn't have to pre-book a space in church, hoping we'd got on the list before the 'acceptable number' was reached - then we'd be delighted . . . And so on.

I'll spare you the rules for 'how to say Mass in COVID conditions' . . .

Nobody is more eager than your clergy to celebrate Mass together with you. But I find it hard to link the word "celebrate" with the COVID rulebook.

We shall overcome some day! But maybe not tomorrow.

THE SUNDAY READINGS offer much enlightenment as ever:

The first reading (Zechariah) : the man on the donkey comes with gifts of peacefulness;

The second reading (Rom 8): St Paul reminds us that we are body, soul - and spirit. "God's Spirit is in my heart; he has called me and set me apart..."

The gospel (St Matthew) Jesus come to show us the Father, and to teach of the gifts of gentle restfulness that the Father offers us through his Son - who helps us bear his gentle yoke.

IN OTHER YEARS a heavy board would be puddled with clay; strong hands would drag the board to the riverbed to soak it; the tracery-image of a holy person would be stretched and displayed; flowers and petals and nuts and seeds and eggshells and coloured silks and peppercorns would be collected together; refreshments prepared and trestles laid out. Yes, in other days we would be preparing for well-dressing. Time to give thanks for those lovely memories not only of hard and heavy work over many months of preparation, but also for the fun, food, fellowship and dedication of parishioners over so many years. And Padley and Lourdes sadly in abeyance..

SAINTS ALIVE honoured this coming week: on July 6th St Maria Goretti is honoured, canonised for her being martyred in defence of the virtue of purity.

St Benedict is a Patron Of Europe, and we join Benedictine monks, Brothers and Sisters in celebrating his greatness on Saturday.

- ♦ Belated congratulations to Fr Daniel on the fourth anniversary of his ordination on 2nd July. Ad Multos Annos! Plurimosque annos!
- ♦ Called on a parishioner or few during the week. One kindly door-opener offered me a sanitiser, a spray and a disinfectant-tissue, which I used with thanks. The next house I called at happily offered gel - which was hidden behind a Holy Water bottle, which I used first!

I read somewhere recently that there has been a dramatic surge in abortions this year, and that the most recent annual statistics indicate 206,000 abortions in England & Wales in a year that 564 a day. Five hundred and sixty four daily `lives that matter`. `Life Matters` do I hear you proclaim?
- Renewed thanks to supporters of the BB/GAM tote. There were two more worthy winners recently, which I briefly noted in a Whatapp missive. Then I fumbly pressed the wrong button and I've lost the names!
- ♦ A chance conversation with one of Arthur Worsley's team of undertakers revealed that while they had been somewhat busier than average over the last 100 days, none of their interments or cremation-commitals listed COVID as the cause of death. Furthermore for the first time in seventeen years, last week that had no 'clients'...
- ♦ A message from the Briars: We are thrilled to say that applications for Team 20-21 remain open! Based in Derbyshire at our retreat centre (The Briars), successful applicants will live together in community for 11 months, working across the Diocese of Nottingham with young people in Schools and Parishes and providing Digital Ministry and content via our YouTube channel, thus carrying out the mission of NDCYS. The various directions and risk assessments are rightly complex and involved, but we are engaging with them and are hopeful that we will be able to secure approval to open the doors in due course.
