THIS SUNDAY is celebrated as the **Day for Life.** Bishop John Sherrington gives a message for this day which you can read further on in the newsletter. We are asked not only to pray for this sanctity of human life, but also generously to support the church its work for this cause.

ALSO THIS SUNDAY we have Fathers' Day, giving chance to give thanks for our fathers, and pray for them, whether alive or dead.

HEROIC ANCESTORS This week we honour some great saints. On Monday, St Aloysius, a young Jesuit is in our calendar. On Tuesday the great English martyrs of the Reformation, Saints John Fisher and Thomas More. We have beautiful windows in Saint Charles church in their honour, and will delight two light candles in front of their images. Saint John the Baptist comes into focus on Thursday. This last great prophet has two feast days: one for his birth, and another for his martyrdom – fitting tributes to Christ's precursor.

BISHOP JOHN SHERRINGTON, the Lead Bishop for Life Issues for the Church in England and Wales, has written to his brother bishops about this year's Day for Life.

"We celebrate Day for Life on Sunday 20 June 2021. This day, inaugurated by Saint John Paul II, presents an opportunity to pray for the gift of life from conception to natural death, to raise awareness of the precious gift of life, and to support the work of protecting life in its most vulnerable stages through the annual collection. This assists pro-life organisations who raise awareness, engage in parliamentary work and pastoral outreach.

The fragility of life and the reality of death has been brought into sharp focus during the Covid-19 pandemic. In the UK alone, more than 126,000 people have died from Covid-19. Yet in the face of such suffering and death, we have also witnessed the extraordinary dedication of healthcare professionals and their loving care for the sick and dying. We too have each made sacrifices for the greater good during this pandemic. These acts of heroic love are a powerful testimony to the fundamental dignity of the human person and to the respect owed to each life, particularly through proper care and love in the last moments of life.

Against this backdrop of loving care, we are now faced with the very real threat of the legalisation of 'assisted suicide' in our country. It is not a question of 'if' this challenge will come, it is now a question of 'when?' There is now a Private Members Bill in the House of Lords on so-called 'Assisted Dying' and it is only a matter of time before the issue is back in the House of Commons.

This year's theme for Day for Life focuses on assisted suicide and the respect owed to life. The online resources are produced to inform Catholics about this threat to life and to share with people our response to such a threat: a true compassion as the just response to the immense value of the human person.

Day for Life adds an authenticity to our witness to the dignity of life and this is enabled by the generosity of people in the pews supporting our work.

In 2020, we were unable to hold our annual 'Day for Life' collection due to the pandemic, our funds are very much depleted and the threats to life have never been greater.

Day for Life is a simple, practical response which pushes back against 'the use and throwaway logic' often at the heart of a culture which seeks to abandon its elderly, sick and dying when 'they no longer serve our interests.'"

AND FINALLY

I was much sustained by the lectionary readings in the latter part of last week. Perhaps the Almighty had a smile on his face. We read on Wednesday from St Paul about planting seeds for later harvesting. One of my diversions that day. On Thursday St Matthew gave us the Lord's prayer with "and do not put us to the test" when being cared for at TGH; on Friday St Paul told the Corinthians of his tribulations in the Lord's service: imprisonment, scourgings, shipwreck, imprisonment et al. A little wrist fracture is not serious enough to be on his list! On Saturday he spoke of his painful affliction and his weaknesses. In response Our Lord reminded him "My grace is enough for you: my power is at its best in weakness." The gospel that day concluded "So do not trouble about tomorrow . . Each day has enough trouble of its own"...

St Thomas More wrote to his daughter before his execution:

I shall remember how Saint Peter at a blast of wind began to sink because of his lack of faith, and I shall do as he did: call upon Christ and pray to him for help. And then I trust he shall place his holy hand on me and in the stormy seas hold me up from drowning.

I die the King's good servant, but God's first.
