POPE FRANCIS WRITES ABOUT WEDNESDAY'S IMPORTANCE:

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Each year, particularly since the publication of the Encyclical <u>Laudato Si'</u> (<u>LS</u>, 24 may 2015), the first day of September is celebrated by the Christian family as the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation and the beginning of the Season of Creation, which concludes on the feast of Saint Francis of Assisi on the fourth of October. During this period, Christians worldwide renew their faith in the God of creation and join in prayer and work for the care of our common home. We need to strengthen the conviction that we are one single human family.

The Earth, our home, is beginning to look more and more like an immensé pile of filth. In many parts of the planet, the elderly lament that once beautiful landscapes are now covered with

rubbish.

Never have we so hurt and mistreated our common home as we have in the last 200 years. We are not God. The Earth was here before us and was given to us.

The idea of infinite or unlimited growth, which proves so attractive to economists, financiers and experts in technology ... is based on the lie that there is an infinite supply of the earth's goods, and this leads to the planet being squeezed dry at every limit. Yet all is not lost. Human beings, while capable of the worst, are also capable of rising above

themselves, choosing again what is good, and making a new start.

"UNLESS YE BECOME LIKE LITTLE CHILDREN" At a clergy gathering this week, one of the members lamented that 'cradle Catholics' missed out on a lot of 'non-Catholic' prayers and hymns.
