

## **PARISH NOTES**

**THIS SUNDAY** We divert from Sunday XIII to celebrate the lives and death of the first and greatest apostle-martyrs, Ss Peter & Paul. St Peter takes the limelight, giving us pause for thought and prayer for his successor as our leader in faith, Pope Francis.

THIS SUNDAY we have the second collection for Peter's Pence.

THE GOSPEL At last Peter recognizes that Jesus is the Messiah, the Christ. At last he realizes that in Jesus they can see the action of God. The disciples followed Jesus as soon as he called, but for a long time they were puzzled what to make of him, of his wonderful teaching and his godlike personality. Now comes a shaft of light and understanding. We too often take some time to appreciate the true worth of someone we know well: a little gesture can sometimes reveal just how generous and thoughtful they are. Peter suddenly grasps that there is God, acting among them, a daunting or even terrifying thought. Jesus replies to Peter's recognition with his own generosity, giving him a new name, 'Rock', for this is what 'Peter' means. If you name something, you make it your own, take it to yourself. This is just what Jesus does with Simon who becomes his own Peter. That is the importance of the naming of a child at Baptism: Jesus takes us to himself and we become his. The early Christians called themselves 'Those over whom the name of Jesus has been called.' We may have been named Mary or John, but the name of Jesus has been called over us and we have become his.

MAY THEY REST IN PEACE I recently conducted the funeral rites at Stockport Crematorium for Sheila Thornton RIP, who recently died aged 82.

On Tuesday this week the funeral rites for the late **Anne Williams RIP (84)** are planned at Immaculate Conception.

We also pray for the later **Jeremiah Naughton RIP (92)** whose funeral rites are indicated for St Charles church on Mon 8th July at 11am. God grant them all eternal rest.

SAINTS ALIVE St Oliver Plunkett (1625 - 1681) was archbishop of Armagh and primate of All Ireland from 1668, at a time when the country was in a state of civil and religious disorder after the interventions of Oliver Cromwell. He persevered for ten years in his effort to ameliorate this state of affairs, until the discovery of a non-existent "Popish Plot" against the English government (invented and revealed by Titus Oates, who implicated many before he was executed for his part in it) gave the authorities an excuse to act against many prominent Catholics. Plunkett was arrested in Ireland but taken to London for trial; one of his companions was saved by being appointed as Bavarian Ambassador to London and therefore acquiring diplomatic immunity, but for Plunkett there was no such escape, and he was hanged at Tyburn, cheating his executioners by dying before he could be ceremonially disembowelled. St Thomas the Apostle is famous for doubting the resurrection of Jesus

when his fellow apostles told him about it; but if he is the sceptical apostle, he is also the believing apostle, for having seen and touched a risen man, he made the immediate leap of faith and so became the first apostle to call Jesus God. Nothing is known about Thomas's later career. A well-known apocryphal document called the Acts of Thomas relates his missionary journeys to Persia and India. Although the document as it stands is not historical evidence (it was written to provide evidence for certain heretical Gnostic teachings), it still bears witness to the likelihood of a tradition that Thomas did go to India. St Elizabeth of Portugal (1271 – 1336 was the daughter of King Peter III of Aragón and was named after her great-aunt, St Elizabeth of Hungary. She was married to King Denis of Portugal, by whom she had two children. She set up hospitals, orphanages, and other institutions, patiently endured her husband's infidelities and provided for the education of his bastards, and acted as peacemaker in the quarrelsome and complicated politics of the time. On her husband's death in 1325 she retired from public affairs and devoted herself to prayer and the service of the poor. Throughout her life she was faithful and regular in prayer, and daily recited the Liturgy of the Hours. In 1336 her son, by now King Alfonso IV of Portugal, went to war against King Alfonso XI of Castile. Elizabeth followed the Portuguese army on the field in an effort to bring about peace. She succeeded, but the effort killed her.
