PARISH NOTES

THIS SUNDAY is also dedicated as 'Education Sunday'. "This year marks the 176th celebration of Education Sunday for the Church in England and Wales. As we commence the beginning of a new academic year, let us entrust to Almighty God all who are involved in the provision of Catholic education in our schools, colleges and universities. We pray that Christ the Teacher will strengthen their faith and fill their hearts with courage and hope. Christ is the foundation of the whole educational enterprise in a Catholic school. As "the way, the truth, and the life" Christ is both the object and subject of Catholic education. A Catholic educational institution seeks to root the Gospel of Christ in the minds and lives of students, providing a holistic formation that promotes human flourishing, inspiring a lifelong love of learning, and fostering the virtues that will assist children and young people to discover in themselves and in others the Truth, Goodness and Beauty of God. On Education Sunday, it is important we give thanks to Almighty God for all who govern, lead, teach, guide, and support the children and young people in our Catholic schools, colleges and universities."

THE GOSPEL Jesus' activity as he goes around 'doing all things well' is the coming of God into the world, the Day of the Lord when the tongues of the dumb will sing for joy. Jesus is the sacrament of God. In him God is active in the world, bringing peace, healing and joy. In him people met and experienced God. His gestures of putting his fingers into the man's ears and touching his tongue with spittle are affectionate ways of showing that God is physically at work in him. In a modern hygieneconscious world such gestures might be frowned upon. But if we are truly acting as the members of Christ's body in the world we cannot hold back, and from time to time will be involved physically and totally in helping others. We too can bring Christ's healing in countless simple, but often costly and courageous, ways.

SAINTS ALIVE St Peter Claver (1581 – 1654 was born in Catalonia and studied at the University of Barcelona. He became a Jesuit and arrived in Cartagena, in what is now Colombia, in 1610, and after his ordination six years later he became 'the slave of the Negroes forever', labouring on their behalf for 33 years, attending to both their spiritual and material needs. He brought fresh food to the slaveships as they arrived, instructed the slaves and baptized them in the faith, followed their progress and kept track of them even when they were sent to the mines and plantations, defending them as well as he could from oppressive slave-owners. He organized teams of catechists who spoke the many languages

spoken by the slaves. He worked in hospitals also, looking after lepers among others, and in prisons. **St John Chrysostom** (349 - 407) was born in Antioch. After a thorough education, he took up the ascetic life.

He was ordained to the priesthood, and became a fruitful and effective preacher. He was elected Patriarch of Constantinople in 397, and was energetic in reforming the ways of the clergy and the laity alike. He incurred the displeasure of the Emperor and was twice forced into exile. When the second exile, to Armenia, had lasted three years, it was decided that he should be sent still further away, but he died on the journey, worn out by his hardships. His sermons and writings did much to explain the Catholic faith and to encourage the living of the Christian life: his eloquence earned him the surname "Chrystostom" (the Greek for "golden mouth").

A BIRTHDAY AND AN ANNIVERSARY. It's been a week of birthdays. Which week isn't? It's been a week of anniversaries, so is every week. September 8th - this Sunday – we would be celebrating the birthday of Our Blessed Lady, were it not for the fact that it's the 23rd Sunday. But we are still delighted to celebrate somewhat in the shadows the birthday of our queen in heaven. And of course the birthday of Our Lady is also the anniversary day of the death of her late majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Can it be two years since she quietly headed off for her deserve place in the kingdom of heaven - another realm beyond her earthly one. So happy birthday to our queen in heaven and may our late majesty rest in peace.

NEXT SATURDAY is the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. It is the day chosen for a national celebration of the Eucharist to be held at Oscott college Birmingham that afternoon. We can associate ourselves with that national celebration and Blessed Sacrament procession in our own local way. There will be a time of veneration, exposition and adoration from 4:30 on Saturday afternoon at St Charles. All of course are welcome.
