PARISH NOTES

THIS SUNDAY The theme of this Sunday's readings invites us to give thanks for God's daring providence in planting the gift of love in human hearts. This love, when celebrated in the sacrament of matrimony, is an expression of God's creative and embracing outreach for the men and women he has created—for each other.

THE GOSPEL Jesus goes beyond the question: God made man and woman such that they should bond together permanently and become one thinking, living being. The word used for one 'body', or one 'flesh', really means one entity, a single, vibrant personality. God's intention was not that they should be separable again. For the Jews the Law of Moses was God's own gift, sacred and unalterable by any human authority. By altering it, by annulling the permission for divorce under certain circumstances, Jesus is implicitly claiming divine authority.

SAINTS ALIVE The feast of the Holy Rosary was instituted by Pope Pius V to celebrate the anniversary of the defeat of the Turkish fleet at the battle of Lepanto on the first Sunday in October 1571, which ended the threat of Muslim domination of the Mediterranean and was ascribed in part to the prayers and processions of the Rosary confraternity in Rome. Later the feast was moved to the fixed date of 7 October. Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli was born in the village of Sotto il Monte, near Bergamo, in 1881. At the age of 11 he entered the seminary at Bergamo and later pursued his studies at the Pontifical Seminary in Rome. He was ordained priest in 1904. He was secretary to the Bishop of Bergamo but from 1921 onwards he served the Holy See directly in various posts, both in Rome and in Bulgaria, Turkey and Greece, culminating as Apostolic Nuncio to France from 1944 until 1953, when he was created cardinal and made the Patriarch of Venice. He was elected Pope John XXIII in 1958. He convoked the Roman Synod, instituted the revision of Canon Law, and called the Second Vatican Council, which opened on 11 October 1962. He died while the Council was still in session, on the evening of 3 June 1963. St Wilfrid was born in Northumbria in 634. As a boy he was educated in the monastery of Lindisfarne, He showed himself to have become a keen supporter of the traditions of the Roman Church as against the prevailing 'Celtic' customs introduced by the Irish missionaries from Iona under St Aidan. Shortly afterwards he was appointed Abbot of Ripon, and sometime later he was ordained priest. After the death of Aidan, the differing customs of the Romans and the Celts became the cause of bitter dispute. In 664 a Synod was held in Whitby, in the famous monastery of St Hilda, to settle the question and Wilfrid took a leading part in the debate, successfully arguing for the abolition of the Celtic traditions and the imposition of the church discipline of Rome. Within twelve months he had been appointed Bishop of Lindisfarne, and later became

Gamesley. Norbert, with his late wife Hilda, was a regular parishioner both at Broadbottom and Hadfield. His funeral arrangements are indicated for Thursday 10th at St Charles church. May his family and friends be comforted.
