

PARISH NOTES

THIS SUNDAY a New Year in the life of the church begins today. We light the candles of our Advent wreaths to mark our increasingly Great Expectations ahead of the celebration of the birth of our redeemer. Happy New Year & Safe Journey to Bethlehem! **The Sunday readings** are from Year C and feature the Gospel of St Luke.

The weekday readings are from cycle 1.

THE GOSPEL READING With this reading we begin the Year of Luke, for his gospel provides the readings for almost all the Sundays of the liturgical year which begins today. We begin at the end, for Luke sees the destruction of Jerusalem as the symbol and foretaste of final liberation at the coming of Christ. The Sack of Jerusalem by the Romans was certainly a decisive moment in the history of the Church, when the possibility vanished for ever of the Church remaining a branch of Judaism. In this sense it was a liberation for the gentile Churches for which Luke was writing his gospel. It is also a symbol of the final liberation from the toils of evil in which humanity is embroiled, and so of the final triumph of

SECOND COLLECTION Next weekend there will be a second collection for the 'Poor Parishes Fund'. SAINTS ALIVE St Ralph Sherwin (1550-1581) was born at Rodsley, Derbyshire and was educated at Eton College. He was a talented classical scholar. He graduated in 1574, being then accounted "an acute philosopher and an excellent Grecian and Hebrician." The following year he became a Catholic and fled abroad to the English College at Douai, where he was ordained a priest in 1577. He left to go to the English College in Rome, where he studied for about three years. In April 1580, Sherwin and thirteen companions (including Edmund Campion and Robert Persons) left Rome for England. They lodged with St Charles Borromeo in Milan en route. He treasured their company. A few months later he was arrested while preaching in a private house in London and imprisoned in the Marshalsea prison, where he converted many fellow prisoners. After a month he was removed to the Tower of London, where he was twice tortured on the rack and then laid out in the snow. He is said to have been offered a bishopric by Queen Elizabeth if he would abandon his Catholicism but refused. After spending a year in prison he was finally brought to trial with Edmund Campion and others on a charge of treasonable conspiracy. He denied this with the comment: "The plain reason of our standing here is religion, not treason." He was convicted in Westminster Hall on 20 November 1581. Eleven days later he was taken to Tyburn on a hurdle along with Alexander Briant, where he was hanged, drawn and quartered. His last words were Jesu, Jesu, Jesu, esto mihi Jesus! He was the first member of the English College in Rome to be martyred. St Francis Xavier (1506 - 1552) was born in the Basque country of Spain. He met Ignatius Loyola when he was a student in Paris, and he was ordained priest in 1537. In 1541 the Pope sent him as part of a mission to Índia, and he spent the rest of his life in the East,

preaching the Gospel in Goa and Malacca. He made many converts and fought against the exploitation of the native population by the Europeans. He spent two years on a successful mission to Japan, laying the foundations of many Christian communities; and in 1552, after entering China secretly to preach the Gospel there, he died of fever and exhaustion on the Chinese island of Shangchwan. St Nicholas was bishop of Myra, in Lycia (now part of Turkey) and died about the middle of the fourth century. He has been venerated throughout the Church, especially since the 10th century. Because of his help to the poor he is the patron saint of pawnbrokers, whose insignia of three golden balls represent the three purses of gold he is said to have given secretly to a poor man who could not afford dowries for his three daughters. His charitable generosity brought about his association with Santa Claus. St Ambrose of Milan (340? - 397) In 374 the bishopric of Milan fell vacant and when Ambrose tried to pacify the conflict between the Catholics and Arians over the appointment of a new bishop, the people turned on him and demanded that he become the bishop himself. He was a layman and not yet baptized (at this time it was common for baptism to be delayed and for people to remain for years as catechumens), but that was no defence. Coerced by the people and by the emperor, he was baptized, ordained, and installed as bishop within a week, on 7 December 374. He died on Holy Saturday, 4 April 397
