PARISH NOTES

THIS SUNDAY is the eighth Sunday (and the last ordinary Sunday till 9th June). At Mass today we hear three parables. If we don't live our faith, we are too blind to lead others. More tragic are those who don't perceive their own blindness. A Christian bears fruit that shows how well or badly we live in the Kingdom. Paul tells us that our heavenly bodies will share the immortality of Christ. ALSO TODAY The last Sunday before Lent is often observed as a Day of Prayer in the Catholic Church for the Unemployed. This day is sometimes called Poverty Action Sunday. The Catholic Church has spoken out on unemployment through the words of popes and bishops. Pope Francis has said that unemployment is a problem that affects people's lives, and that society must work together to help people find solutions. He has also said that a generation without work is a defeat for society and humanity.

THE WEDNESDAY GROUP meets in the oratory after Ash Wednesday's Mass.

NEXT FRIDAY used to be called the 'Women's World Day of Prayer'. Not sure if it is still so-acclaimed. However we are invited to pray for women's welfare everywhere. I hope to make my customary visits to the housebound that day.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS at St Charles on Friday afternoons at 3pm; at BB at 10am on Tuesdays (starting 11th March.)

THE GOSPEL Matthew gathered together the teachings of Jesus on the basic requirements of Christian morality into the Sermon on the Mount; that formed a sort of manifesto for the Kingdom of Heaven, starting with the eight Beatitudes. Luke gathers many of the same teachings into his 'Sermon on the Plain', starting with four Beatitudes. This has provided the gospel readings for the last three Sundays. Matthew, writing for Christians of Jewish origin, stressed Jesus' teaching on the Law, and how Jesus made it more interior and often more demanding. Luke, always aware of the needs of the poor, stresses more our social obligations. As he draws to a conclusion he gives us two of Jesus' warnings, expressed in the vivid language and with the fierce exaggeration and wit which is so characteristic of Jesus' teachings. The first, the splinter and the log, warns us to use the same standards in judging ourselves as we use in judging others. The second, the sound and rotten fruit, is perhaps a double warning. You can judge people only by their actions. More profoundly, it is also a challenge: don't flatter yourself on your achievements until you are good through and through, until the store of goodness in your heart is really overflowing.

MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR LENT 2025: "Let us journey together in hope"

MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR LENT 2025: "Let us journey together in hope" 'Dear brothers and sisters, We begin our annual pilgrimage of Lent in faith and hope with the penitential rite of the imposition of ashes. The Church, our mother and teacher, invites us to open our hearts to God's grace, so that we can celebrate with great joy the paschal victory of Christ the Lord over sin and death, which led Saint Paul to exclaim: "Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" Indeed, Jesus Christ, crucified and risen, is the heart of our faith and the pledge of our hope in the Father's great promise, already fulfilled in his beloved Son: life eternal.'

LENT begins on Wednesday, called Ash Wednesday, when ash from last year's palms are formed in the sign of the cross on our foreheads. It is one of the last two remaining 'days of fasting and abstinence' - the other day being Good Friday. Fasting is the reduction of one's intake of food, while abstinence refers to refraining from something that is good, and not inherently sinful, such as meat. This obligation ceases for those over 60s. It begins the period of 'Easter Duties' which extends to Trinity Sunday (15th June). During this time observant Catholics go to Confession receive Holy Communion.

SHROVETIDE is a mini-season of two days, Monday and Shrove Tuesday, leading up to Ash Wednesday. In days of old, cupboards and larders were cleared of tasty and sweet things forbidden during Lent. These succulent items were amalgamated into a pan, and cooked with an eggy mixture—forming pancakes. LENT LISTS have been appreciated in other days. Copies of these lists are found at the back of church. A NEW DICTIONARY I came across a number of unfamiliar 'new' words recently. My trusty Oxford English Dictionary wasn't much help with 'Influencer', 'Futurist', 'Mindfulness' and ''Wellness''. During Lent I hope to confirm my truest Influencer, and the one who assures my eternal Future is Our Lord. And during my morning meditations I'll keep him constantly in Mind, and "all shall be Well, and all manner of things shall be Well."
