

PARISH NOTES

THE SOLEMNITY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, King of the Universe was instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925, the sixteenth centenary of the Council of Nicaea. In the calendar reforms of the Second Vatican Council, it was transferred to the final Sunday of the liturgical year. The Pope asserted that the most effective defence against the destructive forces of the age is the recognition of the kingship of Christ. Each of us has been anointed with holy oil at baptism, as priest, prophet and king. The feast of Christ the King is thus a good moment to reflect on our kingship and on what "king" means and how to be one. Understanding the feast makes us understand our own call better. The responsibility of a king is then to care for his subjects. How far that responsibility takes one can then be seen in the King of the Universe, who is simultaneously the ruler of all and the servant of all. He rules in triumph; and he rules from the Cross.

JUBILEE OF MUSICIANS As we celebrate this Jubilee Year of Hope we give thanks this weekend for those in our parish who enhance our liturgy with musical support. Through the intercession of Saint Cecilia may the Lord continue to bless them, so that all of us, in singing, may pray twice and so give you glory and praise.

ANOTHER JUBILEE On the solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, Bishop Patrick will celebrate Mass for the University Chaplaincies, and all those connected with Youth Ministry, in St Barnabas Cathedral at 6pm. We are encouraged to pray for young adults and university chaplaincies, especially those in their own parishes.

MAY SHE REST IN PEACE We pray for the late Christine Wild (80) (Pinfold, Hadfield). We pray also for Mike and Kieran who mourn her passing. May eternal light shine upon her. THE GOSPEL The crucifixion scene in Luke, as in all the gospels, is the climax. And Jesus is stressed as being King. The soldiers mock him as such, but the gospel's use of irony ensures that we understand that they are saying more than they realise. They mock him also as Saviour ('Save yourself and us as well!'), and especially in Luke, from the Infancy Stories onwards, is Jesus seen as the true Saviour-God. In Luke the crucifixion scene is primarily a scene of forgiveness, where Jesus carries on to the very end his work of forgiveness, which Luke has underlined throughout the gospel. It begins with the women of Jerusalem mourning for Jesus, and ends with all the spectators departing, beating their breasts, recognizing their universal guilt. Jesus spontaneously forgives his executioners, asking for them God's forgiveness before they even ask themselves. He welcomes into his kingdom of paradise the bandit who spontaneously acknowledges his guilt. It is the climax of the reversal of values which we have seen throughout this gospel that the King should be the wretched figure dying on the Cross, and that homage should be paid to him not by dignified courtiers, but by another wretched figure, dying by his side.

NOVEMBER is drawing to a close. At every Mass celebrated during the month, prayers offered for the eternal welfare of those listed in our memorials.

THE SAINTS this week: The Vietnamese Martyrs The evangelization of Vietnam began in the 16th

century and was formally established with the setting up of two Vicariates Apostolic in 1659. There are now about 6 million Catholics in Vietnam, some 10% of the population. This growth comes partly from the fact that since the earliest times the seed of the Faith has been watered by the blood of the martyrs of Vietnam — the missionary clergy, the local clergy and the ordinary Christian people. They have all shared the labour of apostolic work and have together faced death to bear witness to the truth of the Gospel. In the course of the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries no less than 53 decrees, signed by the lords and emperors of the country from 1625 to 1886, launched one persecution of Christians after another, each one more savage than the last. Over the whole territory of Vietnam about 130,000 Christians were killed in these persecutions. Over the centuries the names of most of them have been lost, but their memory is still alive in the Catholic community. St Catherine of Alexandria (d. 305) Legends coming from a number of sources say that St Catherine was very outspoken at the time of the persecutions of Christians. She even protested openly to the emperor Maxentius who had her arrested, tortured on the wheel and decapitated in 305. St Catherine's courage is a great challenge to all African Christians in their struggle for justice and peace. The witness of her life and her readiness to die for the faith encourages us to be brave witnesses to the Lord and to speak out on behalf of all those who suffer.

SATURDAY MASS Next Saturday's parish Mass will be at 4pm. It will honour the church's year about to come to an end, and equally the imminent celebration of the start of the new church year with Advent. It will also include the enrolment of the candidates for next year's First Holy Communion. All are welcome.
